
Day Trip in Asakusa

Tokyo Travel Workshop

In the second video I told you about the Top 10 Baby Friendly Locations in Tokyo as well as the common mistakes to avoid with the train stations.

Now one of the things I want to help you achieve today is how to combine all this knowledge, everything that you've learned in the first two videos and how to plan it step-by-step and how to apply the core strategy to one of the most popular destinations in Tokyo.

And this most popular destination that we are going to focus on today is also one of the locations I went to when my baby was one or two months old and it was a real struggle. So I don't want you to go through that.

So what I'm going to do is take you through step-by-step how to go to Asakusa and enjoy that area because it is amazing. It's a very old and historical place in Tokyo, so you can really feel the culture and feel like what it used to be like a long long time ago in Japan. So as you can imagine it's not so baby-friendly so what I'm going to do is show you all


the secret spots. All the places that I didn't know when I first started out, but I do know now. So I want to show those to you.

Before we jump in, make sure you watch the VIDEO that goes along with this. There's a HUGE amount of details in the video that I couldn't fit in this document. So make sure you check out the video first!

Asakusa

Asakusa is not far from Tokyo station. Most people get to Asakusa on the Ginza line which is very common. I don't know if you've been to Asakusa before, but it has Sensoji which is an amazing temple. That's why they say it is a "must-see" for any trip to Tokyo. I highly recommend going to Sensoji first. That would be my first stop. It is so beautiful and amazing! You can see this beautiful road lined with little Japanese shops that leads up to the temple and they're all selling really yummy food, beautiful souvenirs and it's a lot of fun. And then I recommend after seeing Sensoji Temple then spend some time in the surrounding side streets and then in the afternoon I recommend going across to Tokyo Sky Tree. Sky Tree is absolutely amazing! It's this huge tower and has the most amazing view of Tokyo and to be honest it's extremely baby-friendly.

So first of all let's look at Sensoji. After arriving at Asakusa Station, you need to walk up to be the Cultural and Tourism Centre. I recommend going this way and then walking all the way up to Sensoji Temple. So let me just take you down to show the Asakusa Culture and Tourism Centre because this place is awesome. Look at this! It has all these wooden slats on the building and a really cool design. It's actually not only an



information centre for tourists but it also has nursing rooms and diaper changing tables so it's fantastic for families. So I highly recommend coming to this corner first before you go to the temple, because if you need to change the nappy or you just need to get organised with your baby then this is a good place to do it. So I highly recommend going and it's very clean.

In addition to the Asakusa Cultural and Tourism Centre there's also diaper changing tables at the Ekimise Department Store and also at ROX shopping mall, so just make sure that you remember this, especially when you're in the temple area. There is also a toilet behind the Sensoji temple which also has an all-access toilet with a diaper changing table. It's behind in the temple, so if you have trouble finding it make sure you ask someone for help and they will be able to show you where to go. This is very



important because these are the locations that I never knew before I had a baby and when I went here when my baby was just a couple of months old and I was completely lost, because I was right in the centre in the really old historical area of Asakusa and I didn't know where I could change the diaper and my baby had a very leaking nappy and I was really stuck. So make sure you remember these because it will really help you when you're there in Asakusa.

Okay so what I want to do now is take you down closer into Asakusa to show you how beautiful it is. So let's just go down and it really is amazing. So check this out. It's awesome! This is what it's like and on the weekends it's even busier but it's so much fun you can see all the shops here, lots of souvenirs and you can see it goes all the way down to the Sensoji temple so it is really really a lot of fun around here. Here is the gate, the entrance to the temple, and it's also a great place to take photos.



After seeing Sensoji Temple you can wander around the back streets. There are a lot of restaurants and eateries there, but to be honest it can be hard to find a spare table. If you're going to go for lunch make sure you go early at about 11 o'clock in the morning for an early lunch if you want to try and get a table, otherwise it's very very hard to find a table.

Alternatively I recommend coming across to the west side of Asakusa if you're looking for something simple. I do recommend Denny's. If you have a toddler who's a bit picky or you find your baby is not used to the Japanese food and you want to have some kind of simple western style food, then Denny's is the place to go. They also have a diaper changing table in the toilets so make sure you consider that. It's a little bit on the other side of Asakusa on the west side, so as you can see there that's

actually right next to the ROX shopping mall and close to the Kitchen Street. So if you are heading in that direction, this can be a lot of fun.



Tokyo Sky Tree

After you've spent the morning at the temple and had a wonderful time walking the backstreets of Asakusa and absorbing the atmosphere, head across to Tokyo Sky Tree. It's amazing and I highly recommend visiting. It's very very child-friendly and it has the Sumida aquarium at the base underneath the Sky Tree. If you do like aquariums then I really recommend visiting here to take a rest. It also has a huge shopping mall and baby facilities and also right up the top of Sky Tree there is also a diaper changing table right up the top. Make sure you also see the view from Sky Tree because it's amazing.

So this is my recommended day trip for Asakusa and the Tokyo Sky Tree. I hope this helps you!
